### AGENDA

- 1) Call to Order Chair Higgins called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm.
- 2) Determination of Quorum A quorum was reached with six commissioners in attendance. Commissioners present: Rob McCloskey, Trey Fouche, Mary Wilson, Carol Livingston, Dave Rusk, Chair Scott Higgins, and Town Commissioner Denis Bilodeau Commissioners absent: Chris Kolkhorst, Andrew Heywood, and Travis Dancy Staff present: Director Troy Fitzsimmons, Assistant Director John DeKemper, Special Events Program Manager Jody Clark, and Suzanne Suttles

#### 3) Approval of Minutes (October)

Commissioner Fouche made a motion to accept the minutes from the October 4, 2018, meeting as written. Commissioner Rusk seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

#### 4) Public Appearances – Citizen Concerns/Comments – None

#### 5) Presentations

a) Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)

Assistant Director DeKemper gave a presentation [see attached] regarding the proposed CIP over the next ten years and handed out copies of the current list [see attached], arranged by both the years that funds are requested and the master list arranged by type. The items highlighted in green are new projects and those highlighted in rose are being deleted. Director Fitzsimmons pointed out that 56% of the Emerald Necklace is completed as of today and that 76% should be completed by the end of 2019 or early 2020. He will need any additional comments or questions regarding the CIP by November 15, and will need the final version of the CIP approved at the December PARC Commission meeting. Most deferred maintenance projects are not included in the CIP. When maintenance projects are delayed, the costs down the road become even more expensive.

b) Lake Cornelius Informal Canoe/Kayak Access Area

Director Fitzsimmons said that Duke Energy has to go through the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) for relicensing. FERC has required that Duke Energy provide multiple public access points all up and down the Catawba River Basin and they are looking at the shoreline along Lake Cornelius. Staff have been working with Duke for over a year discussing opportunities. He shared a presentation [see attached] showing the area. The project location would be passive only, not a motor boat launch or swim beach, but a place where one could drop in a kayak or canoe, or fish from the shoreline. Duke Energy will be making a presentation to the Town Board on November 19. After that, there would potentially be public meetings to discuss any options. Commissioner Fouche said this project is within his area of expertise and volunteered to take on the work to assist with moving it forward.

#### 6) Director's Report

Director Fitzsimmons shared a presentation [see attached] and highlighted the following items from his October 2018 report:

- Special Events: The All American Dog Show was held on October 6 with 500 participants and Laketoberfest on October 20 with about 5,500 people throughout the evening (attendance impacted by weather, bad wreck on I-77 and competing event in Huntersville). Chair Higgins complimented the bands and said he heard from several people that they would be willing to pay for VIP parking. We are bringing in more sponsors for our events. Up next are Hooked on Cornelius (Fall Edition) on Saturday, November 3, at Robbins Park, 10:00 am-12:00 pm; Veterans Day events on Saturday, November 10, at Town Hall, with children's activities at 9:30 am and the traditional ceremony at 11:00 am; a new event, Santa Paws in the Park at Robbins Park on Saturday, November 17, 12:00-2:00 pm; and then Light Up Cornelius at Town Hall on Saturday, November 24.

- Athletics: For the Cornelius-Davidson Youth Winter Basketball League, we have 789 registered so far and should have another 30 or so by the time we are finished. We need more indoor basketball courts to accommodate the demand. 89% of our registered participants are Cornelius and Davidson residents.

- Operations: Tommy Palman, one of our Recreation Program Assistants, worked with Matt Gimbel to complete his Eagle Scout Project at Westmoreland Athletic Complex, improving the hillside area by the retention pond. - Capital Projects: Antiquity Greenway construction is underway.

- NCRPA Conference: Mecklenburg County Commissioners Pat Cotham and Jim Puckett received a special citation for being instrumental in the appropriation of funds to build the North Regional Recreation Center.

#### 7) PARC Commissioner Recommendations & Reports

- a) Items to be placed on record None
- b) Commissioner Reports
  - Commissioner Rob McCloskey It was nice to see such a good turnout at the All American Dog Show, especially after the weather last year. He agreed the bands at Laketoberfest were good and his teens were very engaged. Seeing event visitors walking across the BMS turf field was fantastic. He had been told that we had to cap vendors at that event but would like to discuss that further, because the upper field could accommodate more opportunities for engagement. Chair Higgins agreed that the event should have more vendors. Both supported adding VIP parking, perhaps letting LNWC handle it.
  - 2) Commissioner Trey Fouche He attended the last Town Board meeting when we presented a resolution in support of the Transportation Bonds. Afterwards, he walked out with Town Commissioner Naas and it was good to make that connection before their one-on-one meeting. He attended Laketoberfest and his kids had a great time.
  - 3) Commissioner Mary Wilson No report
  - 4) Commissioner Carol Livingston She attended the All American Dog Show and it was fabulous. She attended the free pickleball clinic with a packed crowd and thought it should be offered more often. She also attended the Town Board meeting to present the resolution of support.
  - 5) Commissioner Chris Kolkhorst Absent
  - 6) Commissioner Andrew Heywood Absent
  - 7) Commissioner Dave Rusk He attended the All American Dog Show. He talked to some of the vendors who seemed unhappy because, once the judging started, they were disconnected.
  - 8) Commissioner Travis Dancy Absent
  - 9) Chair Scott Higgins He attended several Town Hall meetings, has spoken with several groups about the Transportation Bonds, has spoken with the Mayor about referring to our department as PARC instead of "parks and rec", has attended and assisted with the LKN Business Expo, has provided some reports to various groups about PARC projects, and has had two walkthroughs with Antiquity Greenway construction crews.
- c) Town Commissioner Report Commissioner Denis Bilodeau He wrote a full-page article for the December issue of the *Peninsula Navigator* about greenway projects and thanked Director Fitzsimmons for his assistance providing information. He thanked the PARC Commissioners who attended the Town Board meeting in support of the Transportation Bonds. As northern town representative on ASC and he is seeing firsthand that we are not getting the same amount of priority as Charlotte and other areas of the County.

#### 8) Old Business

a) Sponsorship Policy

Jody Clark, Special Events Manager, gave a short presentation [see attached] summarizing the requested changes to the Sponsorship Policy that had been discussed at the October meeting. Commissioner Fouche

made a motion to accept the Sponsorship Policy as presented. Commissioner Rusk seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

- Future Cornelius Arts Center
   Town Commissioner Bilodeau said they are still in the silent fundraising phase, looking for additional naming opportunities, and there is nothing new to report.
- c) Regional Recreation Center Commissioner Rusk reached out because there has been no information and was told there would be an update coming in January, another stakeholders meeting in late January, and a public meeting in February.
- d) North Mecklenburg Joint Park Commissions Meeting Director Fitzsimmons said he has been working with his colleagues in Huntersville and Davidson, as well as Mecklenburg County staff, to plan a joint meeting in January. The meeting will likely be on January 30 at Town Hall. They plan to discuss what the needs are in the northern part of the county but will need to work together on hammering out an agenda. Chair Higgins suggested we identify one thing the three towns can agree and focus on in order for the meeting to be productive.
- e) PARC Commission Goals & Committees

- Public Awareness: Commissioner Wilson has not received any additional input regarding the FAQ Cheat Sheet but will send it back out for one last call. Chair Higgins asked if all the goals were cemented for this committee. Commissioner Wilson will confirm those. She urged the other commissioners to share the article she wrote for *Lakeside Living*, in support of the Transportation Bonds, with their neighborhoods. The Town has hired a part-time Communications Manager, Clayton Murtle. The committee needs to meet with him. Commissioner McCloskey said Ross Boner has continued to do some work on getting greenways onto Google Maps, so if you check you will see some of the greenways and trailheads identified and named.

#### 9) New Business

a) Carolina Rapids-Bailey Road Park Fence Wrap

Thomas Finlay, Executive Director of the Carolina Rapids Soccer Club, shared a presentation [see attached] regarding their proposal to install a fence wrap behind the Bailey Road Park soccer fields. After a discussion and questions, Commissioner Rusk made a motion to approve the proposal as presented, pending review and approval by the Town attorneys. Commissioner Livingston seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

 b) PARC Commission Appointments Chair Higgins said Commissioner Wilson rotates off in January after two full terms and we will be forming a search committee. The open seat has been advertised. We will be looking for adversity and well-qualified people. Commissioner Kolkhorst is up for reappointment.

#### 10) Adjournment

Chair Higgins adjourned the meeting at 7:30 pm.

# PARC Director's Report November 2018

### PROGRAMMING

#### **Recreation Centers**

- Held the first fall edition of Hooked on Cornelius at Robbins Park on November 3 with 17 participants.
- Began a new session of Tai Chi with 20 participants (2017 15).
- Began Open Track Nights at Bailey Road Track on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 6:00-8:00 pm, starting on November 6 and going through February 2019.
- Began marketing for a new fitness class called SKWOD, which is open to adults ages 18 and up and for kids as young as 10 years old accompanied by a parent or guardian. (SKWOD= The S and K are the first initials of the two instructors, Stefani and Kim. WOD is for Work Out of the Day, a standard CrossFit term.)

#### Arts Center

- Held Drop-In Art on Mondays and Thursdays for preschoolers and homeschoolers, with 70 participants over 7 dates (in 2017, 48 participants over 16 dates).
- Opened a new gallery exhibit, *Un-Cover, Re-Cover* featuring mixed media works by Paul Farmer, on November 5, which will run through January 11. The opening reception will be held on Friday, December 7, 6:30-9:00 pm.
- Held a craft booth at the Veterans Day Program at Town Hall on Saturday, November 10, with less than 10 participants.
- Santa's Mailbox began November 26, and will run through December 14.
- Planning for Cocoa with Santa on Friday, December 7, 10:00 am-12:00 pm; Parents Night Out: *Disney's A Christmas Carol* on Friday, December 14, 6:00-9:00 pm; and Frosty's Preschool Holiday Party on Monday, December 17, 10:00 am-12:00 pm.

#### **Athletics**

- Adult Fall Softball games. Due to rain and an early Thanksgiving, the season will conclude by early December.
- LNTA Tennis lessons at Jetton Park continue with 61 participants (90 participants in 2017).
- Hosted four Youth Basketball skills evaluations, three nights of Youth Basketball drafts, two coaches meetings, and a comprehensive staff training. Youth basketball practices began on November 26 for 2018-19 season. Games will begin on December 8. There are 887 participants on 90 teams, with 50 left on waiting lists. (855 participants in 2017). 88% of this year's participants are Cornelius or Davidson residents.
- Managed 2,035 hours of facility usage in October (2,021 hours in 2017).

#### Special Events

- Held the Veterans Day Celebration at Town Hall on November 10, with approximately 500 in attendance (same in 2017).
- Held a new program, Santa Paws in the Park at Robbins Park on Saturday, November 17, with over 350 in attendance.
- Held the 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Light Up Cornelius on Saturday, November 24, at Town Hall with approximately 900 in attendance. (We estimated 1,000 in 2017. Weather could have played a factor.)

### **CAPITAL PROJECTS**

#### Under Design

- **McDowell Creek Greenway** The final easement needed for the project has been recorded. NCDOT has approved Right of Way certification. Staff is working with the State to receive construction authorization.
- Plum Creek (South Bailey Road) Greenway Lennar Homes is dedicating land to Davidson that includes the greenway alignment. Construction drawings are 90% complete. Project should be out to bid by the County in early 2019.
- Smithville-to-JV Washam Greenway The consultant has begun assessing trail alignment options and orderof-magnitude cost estimates. Staff and consultant met to discuss options and improve alignment options to reduce costs. Staff is starting to speak to key property owners where easements are needed.
- **Tennis/Pickleball Complex** Staff is meeting with Bailey's Glen developer to develop the tennis/pickleball complex that was approved in 2015. Staff is also assessing an option to improve the Hough High School tennis complex and open for public use during non-school hours.

#### Under Construction

• Antiquity (South Rocky River) Greenway – Several adjustments were made to the trail alignment to save trees, improve the aesthetics and/or reduce grading. Grading operations are underway.

#### **OPERATIONS**

- Smithville Park New parking lot lights are in and operational.
- **Pruning –** Fall pruning is underway in all parks.
- Seeding Staff aerated, fertilized and seeded bare areas in the park common lawn areas.
- Infields Staff continue to aerovate baseball infields to maintain infield mix softness/prevent compaction.
- Field Lights All lights are once again operational.
- **Trees** \$10,000 in expenses to remove damaged trees this month system wide.
- Town Hall Staff decorated the exterior of Town Hall, and assembled and decorated the Town's Christmas tree.
