
SECOND FLOOR LIFE SAFETY PLAN



TOWN OF CORNELIUS PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY THE MAYOR OF THE TOWN OF CORNELIUS

WHEREAS, the Coronavirus (COVID -19) pandemic has created a state of emergency in the Town of Cornelius; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has declared a state of emergency on behalf of the state on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, Mecklenburg County and the City of Charlotte have declared a state of emergency on behalf of the County and City on March 13, 2020 which proclamation is in effect for the Town of Cornelius by request of the Town's chief elected official (see Exhibit "A" attached, the "County Declaration"); and

WHEREAS, the North Carolina General Assembly has adopted Article 1A of Chapter 166A entitled "North Carolina Emergency Management Act"; and

WHEREAS, G.S. 166A-19.22 authorizes a municipality by ordinance to delegate to the mayor of a municipality the authority to declare a state of emergency pursuant to the procedures of G.S. 166A; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Cornelius Code of Ordinances Section 33.15 (B) authorizes and empowers the Mayor to issue a public proclamation declaring to all persons the existence of a state of emergency, and in order to effectively protect the lives and property of people within the town, to place into effect restrictions authorize by ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority contained in Article 1 of N.C.G.S § 166A, and Cornelius Code of Ordinances Section 33.15, I, Woody Washam, Jr., the Mayor of the Town of Cornelius proclaim the existence of a State of Emergency in the Town of Cornelius.

I further proclaim that the restrictions set forth below are necessary to maintain public order and protect lives and property during this emergency, and that the same shall be in effect within the incorporated limits of the Town of Cornelius until this Proclamation is rescinded.

I further proclaim that the restrictions set forth below are in addition to those which have been imposed by the County Declaration and I hereby order all town employees and all other emergency management personnel subject to my control to cooperate in the enforcement and implementation of the County Declaration and the Town of Cornelius emergency ordinances.

I further proclaim that the following additional public safety measures are in effect: Cancellation, postponement or modification of Town of Cornelius gatherings, meetings, travel and events: Pursuant to Section 33.15 (E)(6) of the Code of Ordinances, non-essential Town of Cornelius gatherings, meetings, travel and events may be cancelled, postponed, or modified to promote efforts being made to overcome or prevent further aggravation of the emergency.

Public Attendance at Town of Cornelius gatherings, meetings and events: Pursuant to Section 33.15 (E)(6) of the Code of Ordinances, public attendance at Town of Cornelius gatherings, meetings and events is hereby reasonably and necessarily prohibited, restricted or modified to promote efforts being made to overcome or prevent further aggravation of the emergency, except in areas or times designated by the Town of Cornelius or the Mecklenburg County Health department in conjunction with County Emergency Management.

Restricted access to Town Facilities, parks and greenways: Pursuant to Section 33.15(E)(5), access to Town Facilities, parks and greenways is reasonably and necessarily prohibited or restricted to promote efforts being made to overcome or prevent further aggravation of the emergency, except in areas or times designated by the Town of Cornelius or the Mecklenburg County Health Department in conjunction of with County Emergency Management.

Authority to those Town Officials imposing Restrictions: Pursuant to G.S. § 166A-19.31(b), the Town Manager and/or his delegee is hereby authorized to determine and impose the public safety prohibitions or restrictions deemed reasonable and necessary to overcome or prevent aggravation of the emergency as set-forth in this Proclamation.

This Proclamation shall become effective immediately and shall remain in effect until rescinded.

Mecklenburg County and City of Charlotte Joint Proclamation of a State of Emergency



By the Chairperson of the Board of Commissioners of Mecklenburg County and the Mayor of the City of Charlotte

WHEREAS the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has created a state of emergency in the County of Mecklenburg and the City of Charlotte; and whereas the Governor has declared a state of emergency on behalf of the state on March 10, 2020; and whereas the North Carolina General assembly has adopted Article 1A of Chapter 166A entitled "North Carolina Emergency Management Act" and whereas G.S. 166A-19.22 authorizes counties to declare a state of emergency under conditions and following procedures contained in G.S. 166A.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority contained in Article 1 of N.C.G.S. Chapter 166A, Article 36A of N.C.G.S. Chapter 14, the Mecklenburg County resolution adopted February 21, 2017 entitled "An Ordinance Authorizing the Declaration of a State of Emergency and the Imposition of Prohibitions and Restrictions During a State of Emergency," and Section 15-20 of the City of Charlotte Municipal Code, we, the Chairperson of the Mecklenburg County Board of Commissioners and the Mayor of the City of Charlotte, proclaim the existence of a State of Emergency in the City of Charlotte and the County of Mecklenburg.

We further proclaim that the ordinances set forth below are necessary to maintain public order and protect lives and property during this emergency, and that the same shall be in effect within the unincorporated area of the County of Mecklenburg and incorporated limits of the City of Charlotte and, by request of the chief elected officials, within the incorporated limits of the Towns of Cornelius, Davidson, Huntersville, Matthews, Mint Hill and Pineville until this Proclamation is rescinded. We hereby order all county employees and all other emergency management personnel subject to my control to cooperate in the enforcement and implementation of the emergency ordinances set forth below.

We further proclaim that Charlotte-Mecklenburg Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) and all applicable supporting plans, mutual assistance compacts, and agreements are in effect and shall remain in effect until this proclamation expires or is rescinded. All city and county employees subject to our control are hereby ordered to cooperate in the implementation of the provisions of the Emergency Operation Plan and all applicable supporting plans, mutual assistance compacts, and agreements, and to furnish assistance thereunder.

We further proclaim that the following public safety measures are in effect:

1. Excessive Price Prohibitions: It is hereby unlawful to sell or rent or offer to sell or rent any goods or services which are consumed or used as a direct result of an emergency or which are consumed or used to preserve, protect, or sustain life, health, safety, or economic well-being of persons or their property with the knowledge and intent to charge

a price that is unreasonably excessive under the circumstances or engage in any price gouging practices as defined by N.C.G.S. 166A-19.23, N.C.G.S.75-37, or N.C.G.S.75-38.

- 2. Restricted Access. Travel upon any public street, alley, or roadway or upon any other public property, within the area(s) or times as designated by the Mecklenburg County Public Health Department in conjunction with County Emergency Management is prohibited except by those in search of medical assistance, food or other commodity or service necessary to sustain the well-being of themselves or their families or some member thereof.
- 3. Restricting Business and Congregation: Pursuant to Section 8 of the Mecklenburg County Emergency Ordinance, movement of people in public places is restricted; the operation of business activity, entertainment, events, or other places of public mass gatherings, is reasonably and necessarily prohibited or restricted to promote efforts being made to overcome or prevent further aggravation of the emergency, except in areas or times designated by the Mecklenburg County Health Department in conjunction with County Emergency Management.
- 4. Any other activities or conditions whereby the control of which may be reasonably necessary to maintain order and protect lives or property during the state of emergency.

This proclamation shall become effective immediately and shall remain in effect until rescinded by the issuing authorities. Proclaimed this the 13th day of March 2020, at 1800 hours.

The Bond order for the Town Center Redevelopment Bonds was approved by the voters on November 5, 2013 and is currently effective until November 5, 2020. The Local Government Commission has entered an order approving a proposed extension of the maximum time period for issuing bonds under the bond order described above. It is necessary, as a condition to the consideration and adoption of an extension of such bond order, to hold a public hearing on the extension of the bond order in the manner required by the Local Government Bond Act.

The Board will hold a public hearing on March 16, 2020 on the question of whether the maximum time period for issuing bonds under the Bond Order should be extended from seven years to 10 years after November 5, 2013. This order will take effect 30 days after its publication.

Manager's Recommendation:

Open public hearing, allow public comment, close public hearing and approve extension of the Bond order.

EXTENSION OF

BOND ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,000,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION TOWN CENTER REDEVELOPMENT BONDS OF THE TOWN OF CORNELIUS, NORTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, on August 19, 2013 the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Cornelius, North Carolina (the "Board") adopted a bond order (the "Bond Order") authorizing \$4,000,000 General Obligation Town Redevelopment Bonds of the Town of Cornelius, North Carolina (the "Town") to pay the costs of public facilities and infrastructure improvements for the purpose of revitalizing the historic Cornelius area (within one mile radius of the intersection of Catawba Avenue and Main Street), including the acquisition, renovation, construction, reconstruction, improving, providing, furnishing and equipping of community activity and arts centers, outdoor water park, outdoor amphitheater, public gathering spaces, and related amenities, streetscape improvements and beautification of public areas, and the acquisition of any necessary land, rights-of-way and easements; and

WHEREAS, the Bond Order took effect upon its approval by the voters of the Town at a referendum on November 5, 2013;

WHEREAS, as permitted by the Local Government Bond Act, the Town applied to the Local Government Commission to extend the Bond Order from seven years to 10 years after November 5, 2013;

WHEREAS, the Local Government Commission formally entered an order approving the Town's request for a three-year extension of the Bond Order on February 4, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Board held a public hearing on March 16, 2020 on the question of whether the maximum time period for issuing bonds under the Bond Order should be extended from seven years to 10 years after November 5, 2013;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF CORNELIUS, NORTH CAROLINA, AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. The maximum time period for issuing bonds under the Bond Order has been extended from seven years to 10 years after November 5, 2013.
 - Section 2. This order will take effect 30 days after its publication.

On March 4, 2019, the Town Board approved a design contract with C-Design for the design, bidding and construction administration for the Cain Center for the Arts. At the current phase of Design Development, Rodgers Builders conducted a construction estimating exercise. This exercise indicated the construction costs are \$19,600,000 which is different than the \$18,888,140 that was estimated after Schematic Design. Town staff and Cain Center for the Arts eliminated items and value engineered, as well as adjusted the overall construction budget These cost increases have been approved by the Cain Center for the Arts Board. Due to the increased construction costs, the architect contract was adjusted to reflect these adjustments. Approval of this amendment is contingent upon the Cain Center for the Arts board approval.

Approve amendment #2 to the Architectural Services Contract, pending approval by the Cain Center for the Arts board.

Dear Mr. Grant:

We understand the value of the Construction Cost for the Cain Arts Center was increased by the client this week. The increased budget, \$19,600,000, will better accommodate the functional, aesthetic and programmatic needs of the project. The professional fee in the executed March 4, 2019 contract was based on a Construction Cost Budget of \$16,848,140. The Construction cost Budget was updated in accordance with Additional service No.1, dated July 3, 2019 to the amount of \$18,848,140.

We request an Additional Services Contract Amendment to reflect this increase in the Construction Cost. The Amendment fee is based on the same percentage as that used to originally determine the Contract fee, 10.696%. To illustrate the fee modification, the following chart shows the additional fee calculation.

In 2017, the Town and the Cain Center for the Arts entered into a Management Services Agreement (MSA). On March 4, 2019, the MSA was amended to further define the relationship and financial obligations of both parties as design started. On August 19, 2019, the MSA was amended again to account for the increase in construction and design cost based on the schematic design cost estimate.

This third amendment adjusts the overall budget and modifies the financial obligations based on the updated construction budget and architect's contract amendment. The revised project budget has increased by \$200,000 to \$22,900,000 This includes an revised construction cost of \$19,600,000 and increase to the design budget of \$80,419. The Cain Center board has approved the project cost increases. This approval is contingent upon the Cain Center for the Arts board approval.

In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions contained herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Town and CACC hereby agree as follows:

- 1. **Budget Amount.** The budget for the construction cost of the Center is \$19,600,000. Accordingly:
 - Exhibit A to the Original Agreement is revised to read as follows:

Work with Town to design the Center so that it can be constructed within the budget of available Town Bond funding [\$4,000,000] and the reasonably achievable fundraising goals determined after the fundraising study [currently \$19,600,000, for a total design and construction budget of \$22,900,000]

- Exhibit D to the First Amendment, is revised as set forth on Exhibit D attached hereto.

SECTION 2. An ad valorem tax rate of \$.222 per \$100 of assessed valuation is hereby established as the official tax rate for the Town of Cornelius for the fiscal year 2019-20. Mayor Washam called the meeting to order at 7:06PM.

2. DETERMINATION OF QUORUM

All commissioners were present for the meeting.

3. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Commissioner Miltich made a motion to approve the agenda as presented. Commissioner Ross seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

4. MOMENT OF SILENCE AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner Miltich introduced BSA Troop 72 scouts that were attending the meeting as part of the requirements for the Eagle required "Citizenship in Community" merit badge. He stated that they had also interviewed him as part of that merit badge. Troop 72, is sponsored by Bethel Presbyterian Church and was founded just over 50 years ago by Tommy Knox, whom the Town honored with a Mayoral Proclamation on their 50th Anniversary.

Jimmy Kinsella, Senior Patrol Leader of BSA Troop 72, led the pledge after a moment of silence was observed.

5. MAYOR/COMMISSIONERS/MANAGER REPORTS

Commissioner Duke reported on the following:

- Attended the Newsmaker breakfast on Feb. 28th featuring affordable housing as the topic. The turnout was significant but no clear answers developed.
- Participated in the Big Day at the Lake kickoff held at the home of Joy Evans. The event is scheduled for July 14th at the Duke Energy Explorium. Reported pledges to date are at \$96,272. Donations will support Big Brothers/Big Sisters of the Central Carolinas and is strongly supported by the Town each year.
- Attended the PARC Commission meeting Feb. 13th.
- Attended the Connecting Cornelius morning event at Harvey's this morning. It was of high quality and substantially attended.
- Discussed Budget Worksheet development done with the help of Town staff. Reported major requests at \$ 7,519,000 above normal funding levels for departments.

Commissioner Ross reported on the following:

• VLN – Crown Lacrosse Classic will be held at Hough High School on Mar. 8th; and the Lake Norman Youth Basketball tournaments will be held in local gyms this weekend.

Commissioner Bilodeau reported on the following:

- Attended the Charlotte Regional Transportation Planning meeting on Feb. 19th with Commissioner Miltich.
- Attended the Lake Norman Chamber luncheon on Feb. 20th with keynote speaker Mark Johnson the NC Superintendent of Public Instruction and educators of the year awards were presented.
- Attended the ASC North and West Advisory Committee meeting on Feb. 26th. The meeting was held at Renaissance West.
- Attended the North Regional Rec. Center public art "Meet the Artist" on Feb. 28th. The land is being cleared and the ground breaking date will be Apr. 22nd. Another opportunity to meet the commissioned artists will be held on June 10th at Bailey Middle School.
- Attended the Connecting Cornelius morning event this morning.
- East side Coffee Chat will be held at OTPH on Mar. 13th (9AM).

Commissioner Miltich reported on the following:

- The NC Turnpike Authority gave an update on Feb. 19th to the CRTPO leadership. There will be 5 separate express lane projects in Mecklenburg County (Monroe Bypass, I-77 Express Lane, I-485-Independence Blvd. to I-77, Independence Blvd. Express Lanes, I-77 to the SC border) and all projects will have different rules for use. The Turnpike Authority is working on creating a nationwide standard for transponders including car manufacturers adding transponders automatically. Cars are currently live streaming a tremendous amount data.
- CRTPO meeting was well attended and Mr. Herron proposed the latest funding for the discretionary fund projects. Some of the bonus allocation projects are

- nearing their deadlines, therefore, funding swaps made by NCDOT have secured the funds for those projects.
- Attended the Chamber's Power Luncheon which honored the area educators.
- Attended the Big Day at the Lake kickoff.
- Attended the Chamber's Focus Friday on Feb. 21st featuring the Chamber's 2020 Legislative Agenda
- Attended a kickoff event called Connect Beyond on Feb. 24th. This will be an integrated regional transit plan that will take approximately 3 years to be developed by 12 counties and 20 transit agencies. He spoke with CATS Executive Director John Lewis about a pilot program of On Demand Transit that uses small scale vans to pick you up and take you where you want to go. Rep. John Torbett stated that there are some discussions between the state and Norfolk Southern regarding the use of their railways. Other conversations were held on drone taxi use in the future and selling airspace above transit stops to developers to help fund the transit lines.
- Attended the LDCAB meeting featuring discussion about standard major subdivisions.
- Charlotte Region Area for Transportation (CRAFT) made up of 4 MPOs and 2 RPOs meeting was held on Feb. 25th and the Pennies for Progress funding mechanism for road projects was discussed.
- Attended the CMS budget workshop.
- Visited the Town of Indian Trail and the Town of Stallings on Feb. 26th to see their traffic concerns.
- Attended the MEAC meeting on Feb. 26th.
- Attended the Newsmaker Breakfast on Feb. 28th featuring affordable housing as the topic.

Mayor Washam reported on the following:

- Connecting Cornelius morning event featuring a transportation update by Deputy Manager Herron and Asst. Manager Beardsley. The next scheduled coffee chat featuring park updates by PARC Director Troy Fitzsimmons will be held on Apr. 6th at Harvey's in Cornelius (8:30AM).
- Attended the Metropolitan Transit Commission (MTC) monthly meeting on Feb. 26th where the main topic discussed was budget. The three northern towns are pushing for area bus stop improvements.
- EDC update the Bailey Road Master Plan is being completed; a small area plan is nearing completion; EDC staff will be conducting a "windshield" tour of the Lake Norman area with the business development team from the Charlotte Regional Business Alliance.

6. CITIZEN CONCERNS/COMMENTS

No concerns or comments were expressed.

7. PUBLIC HEARING

A. <u>REZ 01-20 The Forest at Bailey's Glen PH3V2 Public Hearing #1</u>
Mayor Washam called for a motion to open public hearing #1 for rezoning case REZ 01-20 The Forest at Bailey's Glen, Phase 3 Version 2.

Commissioner Miltich made a motion to open public hearing #1 for REZ 01-20. Commissioner Sisson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

Planning Director Aaron Tucker explained that the rezoning request located at 18375 Barnhardt Road was approved with conditions by the Town Board on June 17, 2019, but due to ongoing litigation it was decided to rehear the case. With that said, Mr. Tucker gave the staff presentation for the proposed 11 single-family homes and amenity center to be built on 13.5 acres located at 18375 Barnhardt Road. He displayed zoning maps and proposed elevations of the amenity center. The community meeting was held on Feb. 27th, the Planning Board will review the project on Apr. 13th and the Town Board public hearing #2 is scheduled for Apr. 20th.

Jake Palillo representing Blue Stream Partners stated that a court reporter was present to capture the hearing due to accusations made in the lawsuit filed by Mr. Violette. He requested that the staff condition for the existing trees along Barnhardt Road to remain unless NCDOT requires the removal be deleted from the approval conditions as he plans to remove the trees that impact site lines when exiting the property. Mr. Palillo explained that he has spent countless hours trying to work with Mr. Violette but has not been successful.

Commissioner Miltich asked if the staff condition requiring the second row of trees was still part of the proposed conditions. Mr. Palillo stated that the berm outside of the NCDOT right-of-way will be planted as required by the Code but the trees in the NCDOT right-of-way will be removed. All other conditions are still agreed to; however, he will not concede to any more ridiculous conditions made by Mr. Violette unless the Board requests it (e.g., there will be no bridge over the pond, no road around the pond, or lots removed to provide internal connectivity).

Mayor Washam invited the public to speak and the following comments were made:

Kevin Violette explained that he does object to the project being built across the street from his 33 acres that his family lives on. He expressed his concerns with building a clubhouse that does not connect to the neighborhood of which it serves. If the project is approved he requested that the driveway located directly across from his son's house be relocated to the neighborhood that it serves (e.g., build a bridge above the pond, a road around the pond, remove a proposed lot and make the cul-de-sac a throughway drive). He asked the Board not to approve a 350 person pavilion across the road from his property or in concession flip the wedding pavilion and build it on the south side.

Attorney Ken Davies, representing Kevin Violette stated that the process has been very difficult, in that originally Mr. Violette had asked for 12 conditions to be attached to the rezoning to which Mr. Palillo had agreed to 6 of the 12. He suggested that if Mr. Palillo would relocate one of the driveways down to Barnhardt Road and Bailey Road, he would not have to cut down any of the existing trees. Attorney Davies pressed the issue for internal connectivity to better serve its residents.

There being no further public comments, Mayor Washam called for a motion to close public hearing #1 on REZ 01-20.

Commissioner Miltich made a motion to close public hearing #1. Commissioner Sisson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

8. CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL

A. FY20 Operating Budget Amendment

Manager Grant gave an overview of the upgrades needed to address the Town's critical IT support, software and system checks. He stated that the \$271,400 will come from fund balance.

Commissioner Miltich made a motion to approve Ordinance #2020-00729 to amend the FY20 operating budget allocating \$271,400 to fund the IT updates from the general fund balance. Commissioner Ross seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

Ordinance #2020-00729 is hereby made part of the minutes by reference.

B. 2020 Legislative Agenda Priorities

Manager Grant gave an overview of the legislative agenda priorities for Cornelius.

Commissioner Sisson stated for the record that she believes the following should reference "**regional**" rather than "Cornelius specific" so that Cornelius businesses are not negatively impacted.

• Enact a local bill that provides for a Cornelius specific sales tax (up to a ½ cent), subject to a voter-approved referendum to fund road construction and maintenance. Tax shall have a seven year sunset, and can be renewed by voter-approved referendum only.

Commissioner Ross made a motion to approve Resolution #2020-00958 as presented by staff for the NC General Assembly to advocate and support the Cornelius priorities of 2020 State Legislative Agenda. Commissioner Bilodeau seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

Resolution #2020-00958 is hereby made part of the minutes by reference.

C. NC 115/Potts Street Roundabout (U-5873) – NCDOT Municipal Agreement Deputy Manager Herron gave an overview of the NCDOT Municipal Agreement for project U-5873 and stated that NCDOT is proposing to cover the current project costs 100%; however, if the costs exceed the available funds, the Town will be responsible for 100% of the overage costs. Commissioner Duke asked how old the cost estimate was. Deputy Manager Herron stated that the estimate is very current.

Commissioner Miltich made motion to approve NCDOT Municipal Agreement for the NC115/Potts Street roundabout project (U-5873). Commissioner Sisson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

D. <u>Torrence Chapel Triple Roundabouts (U-5906) – NCDOT Supplemental Agreement</u>
Deputy Manager Herron explained that the Supplemental Agreement for project U5906 is due to a project funding increase since the Town entered into a Municipal
Agreement in June, 2017. He stated that NCDOT is proposing to cover the current
project costs 100% utilizing federal CMAQ funds and state matching funds; however,

if the costs exceed the available funds, the Town will be responsible for 100% of the overage costs.

Commissioner Ross made a motion to approve NCDOT Supplemental Agreement for the Torrence Chapel triple roundabouts project (U-5906). Commissioner Sisson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

E. Old Public Works Building – Offer to Purchase

Asst. Manager Beardsley gave an overview of the upset bid results for the old Public Works building and stated that Michael Crum was the highest bidder at \$671,050. Commissioner Duke asked if the sale proceeds were earmarked for anything. Manager Grant stated that he is recommending that the funds be used for an "existing building maintenance reserve fund" that was proposed at the Feb. 6th strategic planning session.

Commissioner Miltich made a motion to approve the \$671,050 offer to purchase and contract with Michael Crum for the old Public Works building and authorize the Town Manager and Town Attorney to finalize and execute it. Commissioner Sisson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

F. Move Town Center Redevelopment Bond Extension Public Hearing to Mar. 16th Finance Director Julie Niswonger explained that at the Feb. 17th meeting the public hearing was set for Mar. 2nd; however, due to advertising deadlines the bond extension hearing needs to be rescheduled to Mar. 16th.

Commissioner Bilodeau made a motion to reschedule the Town Center Redevelopment extension public hearing for Mar. 16th. Commissioner Miltich seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

9. CONSENT AGENDA

A. Approve Minutes – Special Meeting Feb. 6th (Approved 5-0)
B. Approve Minutes – Regular Meeting Feb. 17th (Approved 5-0)

Commissioner Ross made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. Commissioner Miltich seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

10. COMMISSIONER CONCERNS

A. Affordable Housing in Cornelius

Commissioner Bilodeau stated that he would like to see a task force created in an effort to come up with an affordable housing plan for the town.

B. Third Party Website Resources on the Town's Website

Commissioner Miltich inquired about the third party websites being available on Cornelius.org as additional resources for new residents. Manager Grant stated that the Town's website does allow third party websites as a resource and if any new organization would like to have their link added, they must meet certain criteria that was adopted by the Board.

11. CLOSED SESSION

A. <u>Advice of Legal Counsel to Discuss Active Litigation and to Receive Board Direction on Contract Negotiations</u>

Mayor Washam called for a motion to go into Closed Session pursuant to NCGS 143-318.11(a)(3) consult with Attorney and NCGS-143.11(a)(5) receive board direction on contract negotiations.

Commissioner Miltich made a motion to go into Closed Session at 8:06PM. Commissioner Sisson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously, 5-0.

12. ADJOURNMENT
