MINUTES

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION - 5:30 PM

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Kolkhorst called the meeting to order at 5:35 p.m.

2. DETERMINATION OF QUORUM

A quorum was reached with eight commissioners in attendance.

Staff present: Director Troy Fitzsimmons, Recreation Superintendent Josh Handelsman, Special Events Program Manager Mike Wolf, and Administrative Assistant Karen Ulmer

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A. December 2022 Draft Minutes

A motion was made to approve the minutes from the December 1, 2022, meeting as written. It was seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

5. PRESENTATIONS

A. 2023 Special Events - Mike Wolf

Special Events Program Manager Wolf shared a presentation [see attached] reviewing 2022 events and looking ahead to 2023 events. Commissioner Fouche said we need to be careful about over-programming Cain Park; it is a small space and steep in parts.

6. DIRECTOR'S REPORT

A. December 2022 Director's Report

Director Fitzsimmons shared a presentation [see attached] highlighting items from his December 2022 report [see attached]. Commissioners discussed concerns about the learning curve for both pedestrians and drivers for use of the HAWK crosswalk system at Westmoreland Road: how it is working and how it is supposed to work.

7. COMMISSIONER RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORTS

A. Commissioner Carla Eustache

- She attended the Candy Cane Dash, and it was fun. She suggested we could probably just have the dash and not all the other activities.
- She has written about Year of the Trail in the past two Lakeside Living articles.

B. Commissioner Trey Fouche

- He has been coaching his son's team again this year and remarked that Athletics Program Manager Shelby Cruse has been doing a great job of communicating with the coaches.
- He attended the HAWK crosswalk commissioning.
- He attended the Cain Center for the Arts public open house, which seemed well attended, and it looks like a great facility. He saw that tonight, for one of their opening events, they were charging \$10 to park in the Town Hall parking lot. He asked where that money goes. Director Fitzsimmons said Cain will keep most of it, and the Town will get \$1 per Food Lion (Town-owned) lot space and \$2 per Town Hall lot space. That fee structure will apply to all private Town Hall parking lot usage moving forward, including Tawba Walks and others. Commissioner Fouche said he has a fundamental problem with the Cain Center charging for use of the Town-owned parking lot. Director Fitzsimmons said the Town is working to improve signage in the Food Lion and Town-opened lot in front of Food Lion lots to educate people where they can and cannot park.
- He has been discovering a number of funding resources through his new job, and he would like to talk to Director Fitzsimmons later about money we could potentially get from the State for the Legion Park playground.

C. Commissioner Jon Show

- Parks and Recreation events were why he joined the board and they have only gotten better since Special Events Manager Wolf has been on board.
- Commissioner Eustache is doing a tremendous job with her Lakeside Living articles; he likes the style in which they are written.
- He praised the changes made improving the ability for school groups to reserve fields. Three or four club sports at Bailey Middle School have been able to reserve fields this year and parents are very grateful.

D. Chair Chris Kolkhorst

- He attended the Flashlight Candy Cane Dash and agreed it was too long, but a great event.
- Implementing the HAWK crosswalk is indeed a challenge but we have increased the safety of that crossing tremendously.
- Lake Norman Little League spring registration is currently open.

E. Commissioner Robert Reed

- He attended the Flashlight Candy Cane Dash with his son, who absolutely loved it. It was great to see Santa, though it was a little long. We need to use a PA system instead of just a bullhorn to communicate during the dash (same with the Easter egg hunt).
- He attended the last Town Board meeting. He continues to tell people around Town that, if they cannot get to the Town Board meeting, they can still watch it livestreamed on Facebook.

F. Commissioner Andrew Heywood

Kudos to the park maintenance team. The parks and greenways look great, and he especially appreciates the improvements made to Jetton Neighborhood Park.

G. Commissioner Dave Rusk

The Northern Regional Recreation Center is phenomenal. It's a feather in our cap to have it located in Cornelius.

8. OLD BUSINESS

A. Parks & Recreation Commission Goals & Committees

- Regional Partnerships Commissioner Fouche said that Paul Freestone, current Chair of the County PRC, had emailed today reminding us we need to organize a regional meeting with the northern towns and the County. He also mentioned a spot for the North Region is currently available on the County Park and Recreation Commission.
- Strategic Planning and Long-Term Finance Commissioner Fouche said that Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools is going to tear down Cornelius Elementary School and rebuild it; we need to be paying attention to how that will affect Wilhelm Park. Director Fitzsimmons said we are aware of the situation.
- Public Awareness Commissioner Eustache said her committee needs to meet again, but
 meanwhile she has met with Communications Manager MaeLynn Joyner and Director Fitzsimmons
 about Year of the Trail plans. They are working towards engaging a marketing firm, looking for
 someone to provide a strategic plan around three goals related to greenways: awareness of
 residents, increase in usage, and economic impact.

B. Growth Management Committee

Commissioner Show said this committee's work is completed, and they presented a report to the Town Board at their last meeting.

C. Neighborhood Advisory Committee

9. **NEW BUSINESS**

A. PRC Appointment Recommendations

Commissioners Fouche and Heywood's terms expire at the end of January, and they are each eligible for another full term.

A motion was made to recommend Commissioners Fouche and Heywood to the Town Board for reappointment. It was seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

We have selected two applicants to interview for the open Parks & Recreation Commission seat and are working to schedule those in the next couple of weeks.

B. PRC Vice-Chair Election (Annual Appointment)

A motion was made to reelect Trey Fouche as Vice-Chair of the PRC. It was seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Motion: Approve, Moved by Chris Kolkhorst, Seconded by Jon Show. Passed. 8-0. Council Members voting Ayes: Eustache, Fouche, Heywood, Kolkhorst, Reed, Rotunda, Rusk, Show. Council Members voting Absent: Dancy.

C. Acknowledge Outgoing Commissioner Dave Rusk

Chair Kolkhorst said we are here to celebrate having Dave Rusk serve as a Parks and Recreation Commissioner over the past six years. Commissioner Rusk said thank you; it's a great responsibility and

he appreciated the opportunity. He enjoyed seeing a government that actually works. He has also enjoyed having the Town Commissioners participate with the PRC, especially having two of them participating.

MINUTES

1) Call to Order

Chair Kolkhorst called the meeting to order at 5:34 p.m.

2) Determination of Quorum

A quorum was reached with all nine commissioners in attendance.

Commissioners present: Carla Eustache, Trey Fouche, Jill Rotunda, Jon Show, Chair Chris Kolkhorst, Robert Reed, Andrew Heywood (via phone), Dave Rusk (via phone), and Travis Dancy, plus Town Commissioners Todd Sansbury and Colin Furcht

Staff present: Director Troy Fitzsimmons, Recreation Superintendent Josh Handelsman, Athletics Program Manager Shelby Cruse, Recreation Program Assistants Emily Halden and Rashad Hart, and Administrative Assistant Karen Ulmer

3) Approval of Minutes (November)

Commissioner Eustache made a motion to approve the minutes from the November 3, 2022, meeting as written. Chair Kolkhorst seconded, and the motion was approved unanimously.

4) Public Appearances – Citizen Concerns/Comments

None

5) Director's Report

Director Fitzsimmons shared a presentation [see attached] highlighting items from his November report [see attached]. He also distributed a printout [see attached] of a FY23 Board Priority Update presentation given by Mecklenburg County Commissioner Elaine Powell in October, showing that \$50 million has been allocated for land acquisition.

6) Parks & Recreation Commissioner Recommendations & Reports

- a) Items to be placed on record
- b) Commissioner Reports
 - 1) Commissioner Carla Eustache
 - She continues to work on Lakeside Living articles, with the most recent one highlighting Year of the Trail in 2023.
 - 2) Commissioner Trey Fouche
 - He is coaching one of his sons in our youth basketball league this year. Athletics Program Manager Shelby Cruse and her team are doing a great job with league organization and communication.
 - He attended Mills Market meeting. That development project ties to CPRD because of Cain Park.
 - New job working for NC State Recreation Resources Service (RRS), the agency that approves state and federal grants for parks and rec agencies (He does not serve Mecklenburg County).
 - 3) Commissioner Jill Rotunda
 - She attended the Veterans Day Program; the speaker and singers were amazing, and the event was very well done.
 - She has been working on greenway overlays for the Public Awareness Committee
 - She met with CPRD staff yesterday to discuss opportunities for 5K races, including offering one to tie into the next Mayors' Fitness Challenge.

- 4) Commissioner Jon Show
 - The Heads Up Cornelius campaign seems to be working, as he has noticed less aggressiveness from drivers approaching crosswalks.
 - He asked about what counts as a crosswalk; for example, if they need stripes within the two parallel lines. Director Fitzsimmons said he would do some research and report back.
- 5) Chair Chris Kolkhorst
 - He reminded the group that there will be a Coffee Chat on Monday, December 5, 8:30 a.m. at H2.

 The mayors from the three northern towns will be here, and he encouraged the PRC to attend if they
 can
 - He also challenged the rest of the PRC to attend Town Board meetings, at least occasionally. Plan and commit now for at least some of the meetings scheduled for 2023. The Town Board meets on the first and third Mondays of each month. If any of those Mondays fall on a holiday, the meeting will be moved to the following day, a Tuesday.
- 6) Commissioner Robert Reed
 - He attended Light Up Cornelius and thought it was awesome. He has received good feedback as well.
- 7) Commissioner Andrew Heywood
 - No report
- 8) Commissioner Dave Rusk
 - No report
- 9) Commissioner Travis Dancy
 - He did not attend the last PRC meetings, so just now able to report that he has heard positive feedback about the Halloween Treat Trail.
 - Upcoming Lake Norman area events include a fishing tournament this weekend and the Huntersville Half Marathon, 10k and 5k, the following weekend.
- c) Town Commissioner Report Commissioner Todd Sansbury
 - 1) The Town held a public meeting on November 16 to discuss the proposed Mills Market development on Catawba Avenue at Meridian Street, next to the Cain Center. There was lots of conversation about walkability in the area. He attended Light Up Cornelius, which was fantastic, but he noticed some difficulty walking around town between Cornelius Elementary and Town Hall, especially around the Cain construction area.
 - 2) Town Commissioner Furcht added that he had not historically attended parks and recreation events before being on the Town Board but has now attended many of them in the past year. CPRD does not get enough credit for these great events. He also commented on the Mills Market public meeting, saying that about 80 people attended, mostly from this part of Town. He encouraged the PRC to attend the next meeting, because they need to hear from even more Town residents. Lastly, he promoted the Lake Norman Lighted Boat Christmas Parade coming up on December 17. It starts at Blythe Landing, goes to Ramsey Creek Park, and finishes at the Duke Energy Explorium. At each facility, they collect toys for Little Smiles.

7) Old Business

- a) Parks & Recreation Commission Goals & Committees
 - Public Awareness Commissioner Eustache said the committee met and came up with plan to promote the Emerald Necklace and 2023's Year of the Trail. CPRD will be engaging a marketing firm to help us support these initiatives. Committee members are taking pictures of access points, parking, etc. on greenways.
- b) Growth Management Committee
 Commissioner Show said the committee has completed its mission. A final report and recommendation to the
- Town Board will be coming out soon.
 c) Neighborhood Advisory Committee
 - Town Commissioner Sansbury said about 6-8 people attended their last meeting; their next meeting is January 24. There about 50 people on their distribution list. They are finding that this committee is not working the way they had hoped, in that the information is not being forwarded from those on their distribution list to the neighborhoods.

8) New Business

a) Cain Center for the Arts Updates

Director Fitzsimmons said he and other CPRD staff met with Cain Center Executive Director Justin Dionne about interaction between Cain and CPRD and Cain Park. Mr. Dionne said all the shows currently scheduled

are on their website. Their plans are to continue visual arts programming and summer camps at the current Cornelius Arts Center location until at least August 2024. They discussed arts programming by CPRD and determined that revenue-producing activities would not be allowable, but that others would be fine, such as free CPRD events that include an art component such as chalk art or crafts. Cain Park won't be available until May or June 2023 because the lawn will need time for the sod/turf to establish.

b) PRC Interview Committee

Commissioners Andrew Heywood and Trey Fouche are both up for reappointment and are interested in reappointment by the Town Board. Dave Rusk is rolling off, having served two full terms, so his last meeting will be January 5, 2023. In the past year, we have received 13 applications. Chair Kolkhorst asked for volunteers to assist with the interview process and Commissioner Eustache volunteered. Town Commissioners Sansbury and Furcht said Town leadership is discussing changes to make all appointed committees work the same in terms of how they are selected, who votes, etc.

9) Adjournment

Chair Kolkhorst adjourned the meeting at 6:41 p.m.



Parks & Recreation Director's Report December 2022

PROGRAMMING

Recreation Centers

- Held a Lake Norman Teen Council meeting at Town Hall with 25 teens in attendance. Thirteen Teen Council members volunteered at Christmas in Davidson, December 1-3.
- Held Cardio Funk at Bailey Road Recreation Center with 63 total attendees for 6 classes.
- Held Open Gym Pickleball for senior age 50 and up with 35 total participants for 3 free play dates. These sessions have moved to Sunday afternoons during youth basketball season.
- Held Bridge classes and lessons with 273 players for the month of November.
- Concluded a six-week session of Tai Chi with 10 total participants.
- Concluded a six-week session of Yoga Kids with 10 total participants

Athletics

- Our 25th season of Cornelius-Davidson Youth Basketball is underway. Practices began on Monday, November 28, and games began on Saturday, December 10. 657 participants ages 7-16 and 111 participants for the Instructional Division, ages 5-6 (In 2021 there were 497 participants, 7-14, and 121 participants, 5-6)
- Youth Flag Football: Polar Bear Edition registration completed on December 12. All divisions sold out with 180 participants and 58 waitlisted. (174 registered and 10 waitlisted for Polar Bear Winter 2022). Practices begin on Wednesday, January 4. First game day is Thursday, January 12.
- Lake Norman Pickleball Association Robbins Park Open Play had 165 participants over 11 days in November. Torrence Chapel Park Open Play had 191 participants over 12 days.
- Lake Norman Tennis Academy had 49 participants in December 2022 (compared to 60 in December 2021).
- Managed 1,052 total hours of facility use in November (697 hours in 2021).

Special Events

- Worked with Waves Entertainment to coordinate their Christmas in Cornelius event on Sunday, December 4, at Cornelius Town Hall. The event had about 1,500-2,000 attendees (our estimate; haven't received number from organizers yet).
- Held the inaugural Flashlight Candy Cane Dash on Sunday, December 11, at Cornelius Town Hall. The event
 was sold out with 200 pre-registered kids, 138 of whom showed up for the event. With family members, the
 event had about 450 attendees. Staff sent a survey to registrants to get feedback and ideas to grow and
 improve the event next year.
- UP NEXT: NEW: Teddy Bear Breakfast at the Cain Center on Monday, January 23, from 8-10 a.m.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Under Design

- Legion Park Sweetwater Utility located the damaged pipe using ground penetrating radar. The exact pipe location was needed to determine if the proposed dual pipe design would impact one of the field light poles. We have confirmed the pipe is far enough away from the light pole to avoid it.
- Smithville-to-JV Washam Greenway A draft partnership agreement has been sent to Town senior management and Mecklenburg County Park and Recreation for review. Staff have confirmed through NCDOT and CRTPO that their \$2.4 million grant can be assigned to the County provided the Scope of Work remains the same.
- Westmoreland Athletic Complex Hardscape plans are nearly complete and are being reviewed by the
 County. This project will help eliminate stormwater damage to the areas between fields and create space for
 spectators to view games. The plans will also add much need landscaping to the facility.

Under Construction

- Caldwell Station Tributary Greenway Construction is underway. Approximately 300 linear feet of soft soils were found in the trail alignment that will need to be excavated and replaced with 12" recycled concrete lifts and geotextiles to create a bridge over the soft material. We used the same process on Plum Creek Phase II.
- Westmoreland Road Mid-Block Crosswalk Construction is complete. Energy United installed the power
 meter and the signals have been activated in test mode. The system should be fully operational by the end of
 December.
- Plum Creek (Beverly) Greenway The developer of the adjacent neighborhood needs to install a storm drainpipe under the trail before the final 35' can be paved. Due to supply chain issues, we anticipate this work will be completed by early 2023.
- Bailey Road Park The soccer and football light replacement project is underway and will conclude by spring 2023.
- McDowell Creek Greenway A gravel walkway was installed between the gravel parking lot on Westmoreland Road and McDowell Creek Greenway to improve access.

OPERATIONS

- **Jetton Neighborhood Park** Storm-damaged and other dead or hazard trees are scheduled to be removed in January.
- Staffing A search is underway for a sixth PMT to be added to the team in January in conjunction with Cain Park opening.
- **Public Works Assistance** Due to a Public Works staffing shortage, we are helping with leaf collection via one PMT daily for a 10-hour shift until further notice.




